


Foundations for Learning is designed to boost early literacy and numeracy development through family engagement

Foundations for Learning can help schools and prior-toschool settings:

- 1. Explore 'everyday' learning activities with **families** and make connections to formal 'in-school' learning
- 2. Support **educators** to reflect on their beliefs and professional practice
- 3. Support educators to nurture and leverage the knowledge and capacities within families to enhance the learning of children
- 4. Strengthen home/school* **partnerships** so that all children thrive

*The term home/school partnerships should be viewed as inclusive of partnerships in prior-to-school settings such as preschool and playgroup



Young children are actively learning wherever they are – at home, in early learning programs, at school and in the community. This 'early learning' is fundamental to their development and significantly shapes their future learning, health and wellbeing outcomes.¹

"Investing time, effort and resources in children's early years...brings lifelong benefits to them and to the whole community."²

The research also tells us that:

- As 90% of a child's brain development occurs before the age of five, the role
 of families is critical in early learning
- When families are engaged in their children's learning at school, positive benefits accrue for children's achievement and wellbeing
- Every family has an important role to play in helping their children to become confident and motivated learners. This is true regardless of parent occupation, education or income
- Home/school partnerships are critical to student success
